PASTOR'S CORNER

Dear St Mary and Assumption Parishioners,

Labor Day weekend was a wet one. It rained three days and accumulated 3.5 more inches of rain. If not needed for this year's crops, it will benefit the sub-soil moisture. My younger brother, newly retired from a robust legal career, was going to come and visit but we figured the rain would hamper our tennis and golf plans. He is now teaching in a Catholic High School, five classes with three preps: British Lit, World History and English. He told me "it is a lot of work" preparing for classes in addition to the parental meetings. He said the worst part is learning to use a MAC vs Windows computer that he has always had. He likes to be busy and get a lot out of each day. My dad used to say, he would do more in one day than most people would do in three. I gave up competing and comparing myself to him long ago. I pray for him and all those who are in a grind to get their Labor done.

With the rainy weekend, I enjoyed reading a book on Labor, John Steinbeck's The Grapes of Wrath (and watching the USOPEN tennis championships in NYC). It is a great book written in 1939 at the end of the great depression and dust bowl of dirty thirties. It is about a 'family" of 10-12 who left the poverty of Oklahoma in search of jobs out west in California. They had seen billboards advertising lots of work on farms. They sold all their possessions for \$16 which gave them a total of \$150. They piled in two cars with their clothes, furniture and mattresses on Route 66 across OK, New Mexico, Arizona and CA. They had food packed with a quarter of beef, flour, cornmeal, and a few staples. When they needed tires a fourth of their money was spent. Gas, food and supplies left them with a few dollars in CA. People they met warned them there was no work, that there were thousands already there filling the jobs, driving labor prices down and looking for work. They said nobody wants Oakies and they should turn back. Go home.

The story is historical fiction, one of class struggle, new technologies after the Industrial Revolution, families striving to put food on the table, a roof overhead, and have a safe existence. When they reach CA, they stay in two camps. The first one has lots of police ordering people around. The second one is self-governed, has beautiful porcelain white indoor showers and toilets. The ladies committee comes to explain how things work. There is a loan system for the impoverished and childcare for those who need it for work. People are friendly and prayerful. They get a break and find a job earning 5 cents for a lug of peaches. If he works hard he earns more than a dollar a day. However, the work only lasted four days. They left for north to work in the cotton harvest where more opportunity awaited.

Many hardships were encountered including the death of grandma and grandpa as a result of travel. The preacher man gets attached and killed and his friend retaliates and murders the attacker.

Overall, the book is full of challenges and real life for the migrants from OK. It is very descriptive and extremely colorful. Steinbeck won a Pulitzer and Nobel literature prize for it and students and others like myself have been enjoying it ever since. Makes me grateful for the labor that I have enjoyed.
